FOREWORD

Based on the scope of its territory and population, New Brunswick is comprised of a large number of territorial units. As a result, the province is fragmented and levels of services vary widely in both rural and regional communities. With a view to improving regional collaboration, Regional Service Commissions (RSCs) were created in 2012 to offer common services and enhance cross-region collaboration. Initially, the RSCs provided solid waste management, regional land use planning and building inspection services. But in order to establish the RSCs, the regions of New Brunswick still face major challenges in terms of efficient service delivery, innovation, protection of natural resources and climate change. Moreover, various issues, such as access to housing, transportation, employment, community support and public safety have been ongoing independently, according to a regional territory-based initiative.

Against this backdrop, a major reform of local government was launched in January 2021. The working together for a strong and sustainable communities initiative aims to improve the governance structure of Regional Service Commissions in order to modernize the former regional management system. Its purpose is to ensure better coordination and collaboration between the regions of the province through a more effective and sustainable system, as well as contributing to improving the quality of life of New Brunswickers. While this reform involves reorganizing the administrative boundaries of local territorial units, its primary purpose is to explore the role and mandate of the Regional Service Commissions by entrusting them with regional leadership in the following areas: economic development, tourism promotion, recreational infrastructure, cost sharing, community development, regional/community transportation and public safety.

In this capacity, the RSCs are required to develop a comprehensive regional strategy to identify strengths and shortcomings in service provision, in the interests of the best use of an established province and actions with particular regard to the additional functions mandated in order to provide direction to the RSCs' Board of Directors for the next five years. Such a strategy must be supported by the Board of each RSC no later than July 14, 2023. The RSCs' regional strategy provides a key opportunity for local governments and the rural district of each region to work closely with stakeholders on regional priorities regarding the RSCs' mandated services.

For RSCs to start the process toward the delivery of these new services that complement the existing services, strategic, focused, meaningful and timely engagement involving a number of stakeholders is required. Moreover, given the many changes to the RSCs' organizational structure and their service delivery model, the regional strategy will need to guide the Commission in ensuring that future services are high quality and affordable to the public, boosting investment opportunities for economic development and business promotion, and helping regions attract entrepreneurs, newcomers and visitors from outside New Brunswick.

At the end of February 2023, Stantec Inc. and Gagnon Strategic Inc. were hired to help the Kent Regional Service Commission (KRSC) carry out the implementation of its regional strategy. Together with the KRSC administrative staff, an approach based on a bottom-up consultation process including working sessions with stakeholders and public surveys was put in place. In addition, each mandated service was subjected to a strategic evaluation, so as to assess needs and actions to be undertaken in the short, medium and long term. Stakeholder consultation also included reaching out to the local First Nations.

These first stages in the process supported the KRSC in the development of a vision statement, regional objectives and potential solutions. An implementation plan, including performance objectives and an accountability framework, follows in a separate document. The document aims to develop the objectives was based on the SMART objectives and the process required to achieve objectives. The regional strategy will enable the KRSC to meet its local obligations under the regional strategy and ensure that it meets minimum service expectations for each new service mandated. Ultimately, the regional strategy will follow the guidelines set out by the Minister of Local Government and Local Government Reform. The strategy will provide the foundations for the development of the RSCs' sector-based plans and regional plans, as defined under the Regional Service Delivery Act.

The following pages present the methodology used to develop the regional strategy and include stakeholders as well as the local First Nations, background information, the KRSCs vision mission and values, a diagnosis, and sector-based objectives with potential solutions that ultimately came into the production of the implementation plan and accountability framework for the KRSC.

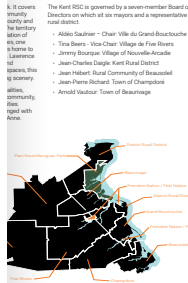

DID YOU KNOW?

Subdivision: Dividing land into two or more lots, creating private access routes or public roads is called subdividing. The Community Planning Act and the Provincial Subdivision Regulation set out the minimum requirements for parcels of land.

Minimum standard size:

- Minimum size of a lot serviced by a private well or septic tank: - 54 m (180 ft) wide - 38 m (125 ft) deep - A surface area of 4,000 m² (1 acre)
- Minimum size of a lot connected to a public sewer system (*unless otherwise specified in a by-law*): - 23 m (76 ft) wide - 30 m (100 ft) deep - A surface area of 692 m² (7,600 ft²)
- Minimum size of a lot connected to a public sewer or water system: - 18 m (60 ft) wide - 30 m (100 ft) deep - A surface area of 540 m² (6,000 ft²)

As a property owner, consulting with our development officers about land you own, or even before purchasing a property, will:

- help you protect your investment;
- help you make an informed decision;
- help make you aware of By-laws and Regulations applicable; and
- help guide you in the process of undertaking a land development project.

PLANET YOUTH

Originating in Iceland, Youth Planet is an evidenced-based program focusing on substance prevention among young people. It has proven highly effective in reducing substance use among young people for over 20 years in that country. Because of the incredible results seen in Iceland, the Province of New Brunswick decided in 2022 to launch a province-wide Planet Youth pilot project with the aim of seeing similar positive results to those seen in Iceland. To date, 16 schools in New Brunswick have been chosen to take part in this project, 3 of the 16 being in Kent (Clément Cormier, Bonar Law, and M.F.R.). The Planet Youth pilot project will be implemented in New Brunswick for a five-year period to see if it is effective in helping to reduce drug use among young people in the province.

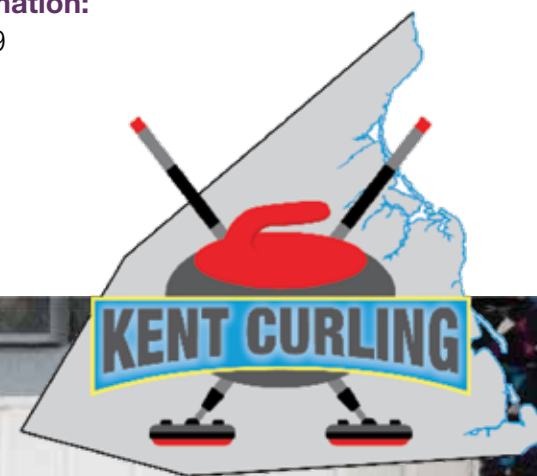

TOURISM AGREEMENT

As part of the Local Governance Reform, the Kent Regional Services Commission (KRSC) is responsible for the tourism development department at regional level.

Regional Destination Marketing Organisations (RDMOs) can take the form of an internal department of the KRSC, an external third party or a hybrid structure made up of the KRSC and the third party. The main feature of the RDMO should be an independent committee that acts as a voice for the region's tourism service providers and influences the tourism promotion strategy. The main objective of the RDMO linked to the KRSC is to be an independent, industry-focused, collaborative body that develops and implements a regional tourism strategy (considering the CSR's economic development mandate and overall regional strategy). The objective of the RDMO is to connect the regional tourism players in the territory covered by the KRSC.

A tourism committee made up of elected representatives and tourism businesspeople has been set up. The KRSC and Destination Sud-Est have signed an agreement to promote tourism in the area served by the KRSC.

The goal of Destination Sud-Est exists is to promote the authenticity of our region. The organization's vision is to be a united, diverse, and inclusive region that offers authentic, first-class experiences. In addition, Destination Sud-Est will act as a regional destination marketing organization and provide guidance and support for the marketing of regional tourism products in collaboration with key players in the tourism industry. BULKY WASTE

The bulky waste collection service continues all year-round, even in winter!

Don't wait! As soon as you have one to six large items to dispose of, register online at www.csrk.ca or by phone at 506-743-1490.



REGISTRATION IS COMPULSORY TO OBTAIN THE SERVICE!

The rules on what is and is not accepted have not changed. The following items will not be collected:

- ✗ Items on trailers or in the box of a truck
- ✗ Opaque bags (black, green, orange, etc.)
- ✗ Disorganized or dangerous batteries
- ✗ Small loose items
- ✗ **Hazardous* products**
- ✗ **Tires and motorized equipment**

* The above items can be taken free of charge to an Eco-depot



CONSTRUCTION AND DEMOLITION MATERIALS

We accept small quantities of construction and demolition (C&D) materials. The six-item limit also applies to these types of materials. Each bag, box or bundle counts as one item.

Acceptable materials include wood, asphalt shingles, siding, carpets, and pipes if the bundles are within the following dimensions of 4 x 2 x 2 ft (1.2 x 0.6 x 0.6 m) and weighing no more than 50 lb (23 kg).

Careful with these items

Windows and mirrors

When compacted, glass can shatter, leaving a substantial amount of debris, or worse, even injure the people handling it.

Before disposing of windows and mirrors:

- Break the glass in advance.
- Place the glass in a box and write «broken glass» on it.
- Attach the frame in a 4 x 2 x 2 ft (1.2 x 0.6 x 0.6 m) bundle.

Wood

We accept small quantities of bundled wood

Before disposing of wood:

- Remove all nails.
- Attach the wood into 4 x 2 x 2 ft (1.2 x 0.6 x 0.6 m) bundles.
- Each bundle should weigh no more than 50 lb (23 kg).



IS YOUR WASTE **SAFE?**

Your waste is handled by several people, both at the time of collection and afterwards during sorting. Help us keep these individuals safe!



BAGS MUST BE:

- Tied up.
- Easy to access.
- Grouped together, based on colour, as much as possible.

BINS SHOULD BE:

- Free of pests (wasps, mice raccoons, etc.)
- Not too deep (bags should be easy to retrieve).
- Free of snow and ice both on and around your bins.

SHARP OBJECTS:

- Items like broken glass or knives should be wrapped in paper, or put in a container, before being placed in a bag.

Never put the following in your regular or bulky waste:

- Needles
- Animal carcasses
- Propane tanks
- Compact fluorescent bulbs
- Paint
- Batteries
- Chemical products
