# THE REGIONAL COMMUNITY GARDEN NETWORK IS IN FULL SWING FOR ANOTHER CONSECUTIVE YEAR!

Did you know that in the summer of 2025, there were a total of 11 community gardens in the Greater Kent Region?

Although the model varies from garden to garden—individual container gardens, collective gardens with assigned plots, school and community gardens, etc.—each of these gardens promotes a spirit of sharing, solidarity and community engagement.





#### Community gardens bring many benefits to our communities:

- They strengthen social ties and reduce isolation.
- · They improve food security.
- They promote the importance of the environment and green spaces.
- They promote physical and mental health.

- Indian Island Headstart daycare garden (Indian Island First Nation, NB)
- Buctouche First Nation Garden (Buctouche First Nation, NB)

In the fall, activities are in full swing during the dormant season to harvest and prepare gardens. Many gardens donate their surplus produce to local food banks. Others, like the Cocagne garden, provide food to programs at Blanche-Bourgeois School.

Some gardens—such as those in Saint-Louis-de-Kent (Beaurivage) and Bonar Law Commons in Rexton (Five Rivers)—even offer a community sharing pantry, where garden surplus is made available to everyone.

These gardens flourish thanks to the dedication and hard work of gardeners: committed citizens, curious young people, and students passionate about learning to garden.

During the gardening season (May to October), we invite you to visit the community gardens near you. If you see our wonderful volunteers at work—or if you happen to run into Monsieur Cârotte (Mario Doiron) in action—come and say hello... and if you feel like it, come and get your hands dirty!


## **COMMUNITY PLAY BOX**

## Planning a subdivision? Start now for spring projects!

If you're considering a subdivision for spring, now is the time to start. The process involves several key steps:

- Pre-Application Consultation: Meet with the KRSC Planning Department to discuss zoning and project requirements.
- Application Submission: Submit your subdivision application with site plans and any supporting documents.
- Technical Review: Development officer reviews your application for compliance.
- Public Notification: Neighbours and the community may be notified for input.
- Approval and conditions: Approved subdivisions may have conditions to complete before final registration.
- Final Registration: Once conditions are met, your subdivision is officially registered.

Starting early ensures each step goes smoothly and your spring project stays on track. Contact the KRSC Planning Department today to begin!

## **Bulky Waste Reminder**

Do you have large items you've been meaning to get rid of? Don't forget to register for KRSC's Bulky Waste Collection! It's the perfect opportunity to clear out those larger things that won't fit in your regular garbage pickup.

And here's a helpful tip: if your item is small enough to fit in a garbage bag, there's no need to wait—you can put it out with your regular collection anytime. Why hold on to it when you can free up that space now? For example, DVDs, garden hoses, flowerpots, boots, and pots and pans can all fit in your clear or blue garbage bag. Make sure to follow the 3-stream recycling system!

Use green bags for organic waste (if it is edible, put it in the green bag!).

Use blue bags for recyclable waste (remember to rinse containers before throwing them in the garbage).

Use clear bags for everything else.





This fall, consider letting your leaves stay where they fall —it's better for your yard, the environment, and even your back! Here's why:

Natural Fertilizer: As leaves break down, they enrich the soil with nutrients.

**Soil Protection**: A natural layer of mulch keeps moisture in and reduces erosion.

**Biodiversity Boost**: Fallen leaves create shelter for insects, pollinators, and small animals.

Less Waste: Avoid filling and hauling countless bags of leaves.

**Less Effort**: Save your energy—no endless raking and bagging required!

So, this autumn, think twice before bagging your leaves.


